A Message From The Fire Chief

It is my honor to present the 2014 Annual Report of the Addison Fire Protection District #1. The report is a summary of the many accomplishments over the past year. We recognize it is an honor to serve our residents and these accomplishments are done in their best interest.

Phase III of our three year renovation of Fire Station #1 was successful. This was again due in part by the leadership and talents of Battalion Chief Scott Heinrich who once again served as our construction manager, supervisor and laborer. His previous construction management experience was very helpful overseeing all the subcontractors utilized in the reconstruction of the exterior of the station. The Phase III reconstruction included the expansion of the front parking lot, replacement of the station marque with an electronic model, replacement of the front entrance bridge, addition of a new emergency exit to the west of the station, security cameras, outdoor lighting, and landscaping. The cold weather set in before we could finish the project entirely, so the completion of the exterior work will be done in the spring with a station rededication on May 2, 2015.



Work continues on becoming an accredited fire district through the Center for Public Safety Excellence (CPSE). Of the 30,000 fire agencies internationally, there are only 200 accredited fire agencies through the CPSE. Deputy Chief Scott Walker continues to develop the necessary data while Deputy Chief Leone adjusts our operational procedures to ensure compliance in the proficiency objectives. It is estimated that we are two years away from completion. Although it will be a lot of work to become accredited it is done to ensure we are offering the best service possible to our residents.

Our Fire District has successfully deployed the quint concept within our three fire stations. Each station has a quint which is capable of being an engine, truck and or squad all at the same time. We have reallocated our personnel with a new staffing goal of a minimum of 5 personnel at each station and an on duty Battalion Chief. All of our quint fire apparatus now has all of the same brand new equipment standardized on all of them through several federal and local grants. The district ordered two new ambulances which are scheduled for delivery in the early fall of 2015.

During the year, the district recognized Lt. Rus Ahlgrim for all of his contributions as he retired after 27 years of service. Battalion Chief Scott Walker was appointed to a newly created Administrative Deputy Fire Chief position. Lt. Chuck Baxa was promoted to Battalion Chief from the vacancy created by Chief Walker's promotion. The district welcomed PM/FF Chris Edwards, PM/FF Louis DiGioia, and PM/FF Chris Gerlich as new members. Fire Commissioner Dr. Daniel LeHoux was reappointed to a new three year term as a Fire Commissioner.



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

FIRE OPERATIONS





Fire Operations Division of the Addison Fire Protection District is where the rubber meets the road. Comprised of emergency services, training, vehicle and equipment maintenance, and communications, the Operations division strives to provide caring and responsive service that meets the emerging needs of our community through teamwork, dedication, and professionalism.

In 2014, the Addison Fire Protection District responded to 1212 non-EMS incidents, which is a slight increase from 2013.

During 2014 the Fire Operations Division experienced the following milestones.

- The district took delivery of and placed into service two 75' Pierce Quints.
- Both Quints were outfitted with new equipment which helped in standardizing all fire apparatus.
- With the addition of the new Quints came Large Diameter hose for all fire apparatus.
 This will add another tool in the tool box when it comes to water supply on the fire ground.



Fire Training

The Addison Fire Protection District Training Division organizes, develops, evaluates, documents and provides training commen-surate with a firefighters' responsibility of protecting the lives and property of the customers we serve in support of the Fire District's Mission Statement.



The Training Division delivers innovative, comprehensive and challenging training, by surpassing the minimum mandatory training requirements, to ensure the firefighters of the Addison Fire Protection District are equipped, in all aspects of their jobs, to provide the highest quality service possible to all our customers in need.



In 2014, department wide, 13966.95 hours of training were performed and documented. Many of those hours were focused on new equipment. That new equipment comprised of the two new Quints, Large diameter hose, and the new extrication equipment purchased with the Quints.



With the addition of the two new Quints we not only received training from Pierce, the manufacturer, but also we were afforded the opportunity to receive training from Battalion Chief Jim Silvernail of the Metro West Fire Protection District. Chief Silvernail instructed all members of the department on Fire Ground Decision Making for Quint Operations. This training was conducted over three days and included both class room and practical application.

As we enter 2015 the main goal of the Training Division is to provide the highest level of training to our members. The division plans on moving forward with the redesign of the training tower. The Training Division will continue coordination with surrounding towns for Multi Company evolution drills, and the revamping of the day to day training sessions. Lastly we plan on hosting another Division twelve VMO class in either the spring or fall.

Fire Prevention

The Addison Fire Prevention Bureau will focus on strategic alliances with the public to achieve a cooperative approach to the health and safety of the Community at large. We will conduct all business in the best ethical, moral, and professional manner.

We, the members of the Addison Fire Prevention Bureau, are a team of dedicated professionals bonded together for the purpose of protecting lives and property within our community. To accomplish this mission, we task ourselves to become increasingly knowledgeable through continuous education and proficient in the area of community risk reduction through code enforcement, public education, and collaboration with the community. We strive to utilize all available resources to achieve this mission and will serve as role models for the citizens of our community to the best of our ability.

Fire Marshal Mike Toika is a 36 year veteran of the Addison Fire District, beginning his career in 1978. Fire Marshal Toika has held several different positions within Addison, beginning with Dispatcher until 1985 when he became a full-time Firefighter/Paramedic with the District. While serving as a Firefighter/Paramedic he began working off duty in the Fire Prevention Bureau. He has served the bureau for 20 years. In 2011 he became the full time Fire Marshal for Addison. Currently he oversees the day to day operations of the Fire Prevention Bureau, Public Education Division, and works closely with the Village of Addison. Fire Marshal Toika is also active in the Illinois Fire Inspectors Association, serving as President, and is a member of the Vision 20 20 Advocacy for Fire Prevention work group.

Inspector Mark Spoo has been a member with Addison Fire Prevention for 9 years. Mark assists in overseeing the day to day operations of the fire prevention inspection duties, monitors fire alarm status' and assigns inspectors duties with regards to Village of Addison building construction and business license inspections.



Firefighter Paramedic Chris Drews has been with the Addison Fire District for 10 years and a member of the Addison Fire Prevention Bureau part time for7 years. Chris' responsibilities include Fire and Life Safety Inspections within Addison, Annual State of Illinois School Inspection in conjunction with the Illinois School Board of Education Rules and Guidelines. Chris has also started working with churches teaching a Crowd Management class.



In 2014 Inspector Michael Heimbecker resigned to take a position with a different community. His time in Addison was exemplary and he will be missed, however we wish him well with his new endeavor.





Lieutenant Bob Shea, and Firefighter Keven Barnes were hired as part time inspectors. Both individuals come to use with varying levels of experience both with Addison, and inspections as a whole. Their responsibilities are to perform fire and life safety inspections throughout the community.

During 2014 the Addison Fire Prevention Bureau conducted 1,465 inspections. While a decrease in overall inspections compared to 2013, the Fire Prevention Bureau was an integral part in working with the Village of Addison on several construction projects that came into Addison including the following projects:

501-545 W. Lake, Old Dominick's Plaza

300 S. Mitchell Ct, new tenant build out for OMG., Inc.

Clyde's Donuts, 1110 – 1120 W. Fullerton. Clyde's donuts has purchased the property and building directly to the east of them and are currently in the process of combining the two buildings into one building.

233 N. Mill Rd (northeast corner) used to be a church and a new day care is due to start business in the not to distant future. There has been significant interior remodeling done on this building, including a fire alarm system and sprinkler system. The Fire Prevention Bureau was very active in helping to achieve this makeover and installation of the Fire and Life Safety systems.

Several discussions are on-going at the Village level with property management companies and potential businesses for the old Applebee's (Lake/Lombard), Nana's (by Marcus Theater), and Home Run Inn Pizza.

5N101 Rohlwing Road. This property (DeMarco's Restaurant strip mall) is in the process of being annexed into the Village of Addison, which will then require them to de-annex from Itasca Fire District and annex into Addison Fire District.

The Northwest and Southeast corners of Rohlwing and Lake are also involved in projects with Addison. The northwest corner wants city water and is in the process of discussing annexation into Addison. This will then have to be de-annexed from Bloomingdale (if annexed into Addison) into us. The southeast corner (old Mobile Station) will start demolition and construction in early to mid spring. The new business will be a Bucky's Gas Mart and Car Wash. There will be access off of northbound Rohlwing, and Lake St. There will also be an entrance/egress at Lake and Central (by Mario's).

The Jet Brite \$3 car wash at Lake and Mill has acquired the property to the east where M&N Auto used to be. They will be building a new building with better access and vehicle movement on the M&N property then tearing down their current building to facilitate these improvements. More info to follow.

Fire Prevention worked with the Village of Addison and William Ryan Homes on an acceptable proposal to develop a single family subdivision on the old Addison Par Three golf course at Army and Mill.

In 2015 the Fire Prevention Bureau is anticipating development to continue on the above mentioned projects, especially the William Ryan Home Project at Army and Mill. There will also be development on the southwest corner of Rohlwing Road and Woodland Avenue for a townhome development.

With these projects, and the renewed growth in Addison 2015 is projecting to be a very busy and productive year for the Fire Prevention Bureau.

<u> Uniforms and Bunker Gear</u>



Uniforms & Morning Pride Turn Out Gear

The Addison Fire Protection District supplies all uniforms and turnout gear for our District personnel. We employ the Quarter Master system for the supply and replacement of uniforms and structural firefighting turnout clothing. This system has proved to be a very cost effective method for the District. The quartermaster system supplies the actual clothing items to personnel who request them. We feel this method is more efficient than giving annual clothing allowances to personnel, as some other fire departments currently do.

We continue to work extremely well with Fireground Supply/W.S. Darley in West Chicago, Illinois. We receive very competitive pricing from them and their customer service is unsurpassed. Fireground Supply/W.S. Darley will continue to be our primary uniform and firefighting equipment provider.

Competitive bidding has helped our department hold down the cost on work clothing and firefighting gear. Team Sales is our primary provider for printed t-shirts and is not only is very cost effective but provide outstanding the quality and customer service.

We are constantly looking to improve uniforms and fire equipment for the good of the organization. In 2014 I attended FDIC (Fire Department Instructors conference) and met

with all of our major manufacturers. After meeting with Morning Pride we are able to provide new Improvements to are Turnout Gear. This includes The new "Black" Moisture Barrier, 3D Biflex Heat Channel Knees, new improved "New York" trim package, LTO comfortable chin strap, hybrid wristlets, flashlight holder, and DRD Articulating with rolled handle.

<u> Underwater Rescue and Recovery</u>

Addison Fire Protection District Water Rescue Team

The water rescue team consists of 7 highly trained and motivated members whose job it is to respond to emergencies in the water both in District and throughout the County as part of the MABAS Division 12 team. Team members are trained in SCUBA, ice and swift water rescue techniques.

This year team members got to take park in a unique opportunity. Through MABAS – IL, team members along with members from the rest of Division 12 took part in an exercise working with Division 3. During this exercise 2 victims were placed. Both victims required the use of boats to conduct the search which is far more complicated than the usual shore based search. This exercise also tested the ability to deploy as part of a MABAS task force utilizing our Station 3 as the point of departure. All of our Addison team members have obtained their MABAS IL Tier 2 cards. These cards allow our members to be deployed to assist in emergencies both in and out of Illinois.







With the assistance

of the MABAS Division our members have access to better and more equipment than any time in our team's history. One significant safety improvement came when the Division began to equip our dive set ups with an air control valve that allows our personnel, in the event of an emergency, to keep their masks on while switching to an emergency air supply.

In 2014 the team had several calls for service. We responded to North Riverside to assist them in searching the river for a reported person in the water.

We also responded to Warrenville for the report of a person who fell through the ice.

In total Departments in Division 12 responded to 16 requests for service.

FIRE INVESTIGATION



Fire Investigation

The Fire Investigation Team would like to congratulate Lt. Rus Ahlgrim on his retirement after 28 years of service to the Addison Fire Protection District #1. Over the years, Lt. Ahlgrim did a great job of being a part of the Fire Investigation Team. We wish him a long and prosperous retirement!

It is the fire departments responsibility to investigate cause and origin. We accomplish this by interviewing witnesses and "digging" out the scene. While looking into the general area that the fire started in, we look for clues as to what started the fire. Sometimes we find electrical issues, candles,

smoking materials, and even accelerants (gasoline, lighter fluid, etc.) Accelerants in small amounts are very difficult to find. This is where we can call for

assistance. Accelerant detection canines are trained to sniff out very minute traces of accelerants that may have been used to start the fire. Dogs' sense of smell is 100,000 to 1,000,000 times more acute than a human's. We ask for the accelerant K9 whenever we have a suspicious fires and fires with victims. We can get the help from the State Fire Marshalls Office or through the DuPage County Arson Task Force.



Investigation Classification

Intentional set fires, Incendiary, or Arson is the willful or malicious burning of property especially with criminal or fraudulent intent.

Accidental means the cause does not involve an intentional human act to ignite or spread the fire into an area where the fire should not be.

Natural is caused without any direct human intervention or action such as lightning, earthquake, and wind.

Undetermined is any opinion regarding the cause is less than probable, or where the fire is still under investigation and cause might be determined later if new information or evidence is discovered. In the 2014 year here is the list of our fire classifications:

H<u>AZARDOUS MATERIALS TEAM</u>

For over 28 years, the Addison Fire Protection District has been on the leading edge of Hazardous materials response and mitigation. Our involvement with MABAS-12 and MABAS-IL remained strong throughout the year and continues to evolve.

As another year went by, the team remained busy with training and some team re-organization. FF/PM John Rice took over as the Assistant Team Leader, backing up Lt. Mansfield with the Addison Hazmat duties.

The department participated in a variety of drills throughout MABAS-12 including a high profile drill utilizing a Metra rail car for a simulated agent release. Also, Lt. Mansfield helped coordinate a large scale bioterrorism drill at the USPS-Carol Stream for all the US postal inspectors and staff members of the department.

Finally, the department took the lead role with Ebola response for MABAS-12 with Lt. Mansfield assisting in a countywide response plan as well as a department response profile.

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<u>GROUNDS</u> & F<u>ACILITIES</u>



Although the facilities of the Addison Fire District are owned by the tax payers of the District, we, the members of the District call these buildings our home. During our career we will spend one third of our adult life here, which is more than some members will spend in their own homes. Because of the constant use that these facilities endure, building maintenance is endless. Some of the maintenance has to be performed by outside contractors, but the bulk of the repairs are completed inhouse by shift personnel. Much as you would try to repair your own home to save money, our money is from the tax payers and any money saved is a reflection on how the District is supervised and accountable to the tax payers.

This past year we completed phase two of a three phase project, the completion of the interior renovation of station one. Last year phase two was started with the renovation of the upstairs portion of the administrative offices. This year the lower level was renovated which also included the washrooms upstairs. Phase three was also started which will be covered in a separate report. Most of the renovation work was completed by shift personnel, both while on duty and off duty.

Other projects completed in 2014

- The year started with a bang, frozen then burst sprinkler pipes at stations two and three. Both repairs were completed by outside contractors
- Shelving for our station supplies was installed at station three by FF Jim Skala
- New drinking fountains at stations one and three were installed by FFPM Jason Halstead and an outside contractor
- New door operators were installed at stations one and two. All three stations were upgraded with warning lights
 on the overhead doors to alert the vehicle operators as to when the doors were completely open. This work was
 coordinated by FFPM Brian Smith and completed by an outside contractor.
- Security cameras were installed at station one. These cameras cover the outside, the apparatus floor and some
 critical areas of the office. This work was coordinated by DC Scott Walker and completed by an outside
 contractor.
- Electric roof heaters were installed at station two. Over the years we have been experiencing ice dams which was causing damage to the inside of the station, so far this year it appears as if they are working. This work also included the installation of the electric to run these units. All of this work was completed by FFPM Jason Halstead.
- Gutter replacement at stations two and three, leaking gutters were causing safety issues during the winter months. This work was coordinated by FFPM Brian Smith and completed by an outside contractor.
- Removal of the lighting for our training facility at station two. The light towers were starting to break free from the bases that hold them in place, they were beyond repair. This work was completed by an outside contractor.
- Electronic marquees were installed at stations two and three. This project was coordinated by IT guru Hector Carrion and completed by an outside vendor.
- Paint the interior of station two. This project was completed by shift personnel.

Anticipated Projects for 2015

- Complete the exterior remodel of station one with rededication ceremony
- Install a security camera system at stations two and three
- Install traffic warning lights at the exits from station one
- Remodel the lieutenants office at stations two and three
- Update the training facilities at station two
- Install new light towers for the training facility at station two
- Repair the electrical problem at station three and complete the marquee installation

In closing I would like to say thank-you to the Addison Fire District for allowing me the freedom to do something I truly love and to be so closely involved with the last 25 years, the building maintenance division. I tried to fix everything I could and the things I couldn't I tried to spend our money wisely. I feel I've laid the ground work for others to follow and I know that in my retirement I have left the District in good hands.

PHASE | RENOVATIONS



Phase Three Renovation

Phase three of the station one renovation project is the final phase of the project. Phase three has three main goals to be achieved, replace the deteriorating aspects of the front of the station, increase the functionality of the station and give the station some curb appeal.

The bridge that traversed the moat area and led to the front entrance was in sorry shape. The steel that supported the crumbling concrete walk was starting to sag and was nearly rusted through. The brick and concrete retaining walls were cracked and starting to crumble. Most of the sidewalks had settled over the years, some as much as six inches. The railings that we had spent so much time over the years repainting had rusted so bad that the posts into the concrete were nonexistent in many areas. The existing air conditioning units that had originally been placed by the front wall were old; the coolant lines were buried and were starting to leak. One of the units was an original from when the station was built.

Our front parking lot was terribly undersized and had only one handicapped parking spot. With the renovation of the downstairs classroom and kitchen area, we wanted to attract more groups to use our facility but we lacked parking. Our emergency access to our busiest still district (6) was lacking. We are forced to drive around the block to get to an area directly behind our station adding two to three minutes onto our response time. Our HVAC system was old and needed a total replacement with access to the units and all of the equipment included.

We had a Com-Cast line that ran right in front of the entry way, dedicated to our station only. We had five well established ash trees that had succumb to the Emerald Ash Borer, our evergreen bushes had become overgrown and whenever it rained we had a constant mudslide by the stairs in the back that led to the basement entrance, we had a major curb appeal problem.

FGM Architects were hired to design our new look. FGM had designed the original station so by hiring them we were able to save some money; they had the original structural drawings already in hand. Jason Estes is their lead architect and has done an excellent job in guiding this process. FGM came up with a design that addressed all of our concerns which was approved by the Board of Trustees. In late August the game was on. We had an extremely tight timeline to complete the project if we wanted completion by early December.

In order for the demolition to commence we had to first replace and relocate our HVAC units. Once the demolition was completed we needed to ensure that there would be no interruption of service to our customers, the new emergency access to Church Street had to be completed. Thanks to our friends at the Village Of Addison, we were able to straighten the parking lot on the North side and build an emergency access driveway on Village property leading to Church Street. In the meantime, excavation was started on the rest of the property to be renovated.

Concrete work was going to be the biggest factor in staying on schedule, who knew that there was going to be a concrete shortage this summer? That combined with an overbooked and understaffed contractor led to the project being three weeks behind schedule by mid-October. Thank God for very little rain and the rest of the contractors that were able to get us closer to our scheduled completion date. Things were starting to look-up until winter decided to return in early November. The concrete was completed thanks to some late afternoon pours, thanks to the Village and District members for providing lights late into the night. The masonry was almost completed by using temporary enclosures with heaters and workers not afraid to work in the cold.

So what's left to be accomplished? As of this writing, January 23, 2015, the masonry contractor has about three days of work to

be completed. The electrician is awaiting the masonry completion and has less than a days work. The signs are scheduled to be installed next week along with the railings and hand rails. In March the irrigation system will be installed followed by all of the landscape plantings including final grade and grass areas. The final piece to the puzzle will be the completion of the front parking lot which only has a binder coat installed. Rededication of the Mike S. Puntillo station is scheduled for May 2, 2015 with the remaining Puntillo family to be in attendance.

I'd like to personally thank the members of the Addison Fire District, from the Trustees who entrusted me with this project, the Chief officers who covered my other department responsibilities and my calls while I was knee deep in mud and could not respond, my Lieutenants that ran my shift while I was engrossed in this project, my Firefighters that helped wherever they could and the office staff that had to put up with me **every day**, especially when things were not going exactly as I planned. Lastly, I'd like to thank my wife Jami who saw very little of me for four and a half months, except to eat, shower and go to bed.

Self Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA)

The SCBA is one of the most important pieces of a firefighter's equipment. With the amount of volatile products in homes today it is vital that the District has reliable protection for its members during fires or emergencies.

After receiving a FEMA grant the District went into an extensive evaluation process to purchase new air packs. During the evaluation we looked at updated versions of our current MSA air packs and at new air packs from SCOTT. Just prior to making a decision MSA introduced the newest product in their line, the G1 Air Pack. The G1 will have the latest technology combined with several other features making it the perfect fit for the District. The District ordered 37 of the new G1 air Packs from MSA.

In 2013 the NFPA revised its standard,

NFPA 1981 Standard for Open Circuit Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus for Fire and Emergency Services. These changes included:

- •testing for increased face piece lens integrity
- •new voice communication intelligibility requirements
- •changes to the end of service time indicator

These changes will lead to a much safer unit for our firefighters.

The District also maintains two compressed air fill stations at Station 2 and 3. These compressors generate Grade "E" compressed air which is pure enough for diving systems and far exceeds what is required for firefighting or hazardous materials operations. The compressors are professionally maintained and tested on a quarterly basis by Air One Equipment.

This year's big displays were a sprinkler demonstration and a 2 car auto extrication demonstration.

Vehicle & Equipment Maintenance

The Addison Fire Protection District Division of Vehicle & Equipment maintenance is responsible for the maintenance and repair of all District-owned vehicles and equipment. The division is also responsible for vehicle acquisition, testing and licensing.

The division consists of two ancillary personnel, who primarily perform preventive maintenance services on all ambulances and automobiles, with the larger apparatus preventive maintenance being outsourced. All repairs of a minor nature are handled by these ancillary maintenance technicians. A Battalion Chief oversees the technicians and is charged with handling all vehicle acquisition and licensing issues.

Maintenance and repair of all small tools is being accomplished by three personnel on shift.

2014 was another busy year for the Vehicle Maintenance Division. The overall condition of the

fleet has improved further, with less down-time for our critical apparatus.

During 2014, the division experienced the following milestones:

- Delivery and placement in service of a new Deputy Fire Chief's vehicle.
- Delivery and placement in service of two new 75' Pierce Quints.
- The 2003 Pierce Tower was decommissioned and sold to Littlie Creek Fire Rescue.
- The 1996 E-One Engine has been placed in deep reserve and is currently listed for sale with a broker.
- The 2000 Expedition used by the FPB was decommissioned and sold at auction.
- A new Ford F250 plow vehicle was ordered to replace the departments older plow vehicle.

Two Ford F550 ambulances have been ordered.

In the coming year, we would like to attain the following goals:

- Improve the overall condition of the fleet, both mechanically and in appearance.
- Sale of the remaining surplus apparatus.
- Placement of two new ambulances in service.

Research companies to provide the yearly apparatus pump testing.

CPR - CTC



CPR DIVISION 2014 Annual Report

Organization

In mid-2014, there was a re-organization of the Addison Fire District's CPR Division and Community Training Center (CTC). Battalion Chief Brock Herion became the new Community Training Center Coordinator (CTCC). The CTCC is responsible for representing the CTC and serving as the primary contact between the CTC and the American Heart Association. Additional responsibilities include: understanding of AHA programs, management and storage of CTC records, appointment of all CTC faculty members, and management of instructor alignment on the Instructor's Network. Lt. Roger Bayne Jr became the CPR liaison and his duties include: assisting the CTCC in supervision of the CTC, managing instructor compliance with AHA and CTC policy, and managing the day to day operations of the CTC. FF/PM Greg Schwartz became the CPR Coordinator and he is responsible for review and purchase of items for the CTC and the supervision of instructors. FF/PM Mike Crivellone remained an Assistant TC Coordinator and is

responsible for providing guidance and assistance to instructors, managing the transfer of instructor's records, releasing card requests from instructors, managing instructor license status, and maintains complete instructor records. FF/PM Jason Halstead is also an Assistant TC Coordinator and he is responsible for scheduling AFD classes in the community and assigning instructors for community classes. FF/PM Patrick, Assistant TC Coordinator, is responsible for scheduling and coordinating training site inspections for our 81 training sites.

At the close of 2014, the Addison CTC was responsible for the licensing, guidance, and oversight of 392 instructors, who teach BLS, PALS, and ACLS classes. These 392 instructors were teaching through 81 different training sites. In total, there were 22,782 students instructed by Addison CTC Instructors in 2014.

American Heart Association 2014 Scientific Sessions

In November 2014, The American Heart Association hosted their annual Scientific Sessions Conference & Resuscitation Symposium at the McCormick Place Convention Center, in Chicago. This four-day event provides researchers in the medical and pharmaceutical industries the opportunity to network and present abstracts to the audience in order to influence treatment in life-threatening emergencies. Topics included: the effectiveness of epinephrine in pulseless patients, the negative consequences of large volume fluid boluses in trauma patients, targeting different populations to teach CPR in the community, and many more. This conference was attended by FF/PM Greg Schwartz.

CPR Training for Residents and Business Community

Throughout 2014 the Addison Fire Protection District's CPR Division taught CPR and First Aid to healthcare providers, local businesses, community members, and various departments within the village. We continue to provide monthly Healthcare Provider classes for a competitive rate. In October, we hosted 10 friends and family members for our annual CPR Training and Pizza Party. We also continued to offer high-quality training to local businesses, many of which are repeat clients. Some of the businesses include: M&M Mars, Syncreon Inc., Communication Builders, and Technology Center of DuPage.

Goals for 2015

For 2015, the CPR Division will strategically offer BLS Instructor's Training on a limited basis. This will allow us to more carefully screen potential instructors as well as better serve our existing instructor base. In addition, we will continue to offer high-quality training in Healthcare Provider, Heartsaver CPR/AED, Heartsaver First Aid, and Friends and Family CPR. Additionally, we would like to expand our advertising in both the electronic and printed media in order to gain exposure to the public and business community. We will budget in order to more accurately reflect our administrative costs, upgrade and/or replace our existing manikins, as well as increased advertisement.

In following with the District's strategic goals; the CPR Division will partner with The Henry Hyde Resource Center to reach out to the Spanish speaking population within the community by offering monthly CPR and First Aid training.



Incidents:

In 2014, there were no Technical Rescue Incidents in Addison that required a MABAS response. We did respond to several extrications in and out of the district and several vehicles into building calls. There were no callouts MABAS Division 12 TRT responses as well.

Training:

In 2014, the Addison team members continued to be active in the MABAS 12 TRT monthly trainings. All members meet the required drills for the year. These trainings involved classroom and practical sessions that covered trench, confined space, vertical, and structural collapse. BC Herion and FFPM Rice participated in a Div. 12 TRT response drill with Div. 20, in West Chester.

Equipment:

In 2014, we purchased new rescue rope, rope bags, and basket bridle hardware for the rope rescue bags on the quints.

Upcoming year:

In 2015, we hope to continue to have a high level of participation in training by the team members. Also, we will look to replace some of older hardware items, purchase rope rescue items for the engines, and look at cordless tool sets for the engines.

We look to continue to send members for additional education and look at possible team member additions.

Emergency Medical Operations

The Addison Fire Protection District provides Advanced Life Support (ALS) emergency medical services (EMS) with paramedics. The District has over 50 licensed paramedics and provides a minimum of 9 each shift. EMS is provided by three paramedic ambulances and by having paramedics on our three frontline fire vehicles - Quints. We added the third ALS Quint in November.

The licensed paramedics of the Addison Fire District must adhere to state requirements of 120 hours of continuing education within four years. Most of our paramedics exceed this requirement with extensive in-house training.

Along with the state regulations for the paramedics, there are also state regulations for our vehicles. Each ambulance must be inspected by Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH). Also, our equipment on the ambulances and the quints receive an annual inspection from our Good Samaritan Hospital regional inspectors.

In 2014, the District responded to 3150 emergency medical incidents. This is an increase from 2013, when we had 3023 calls. We have seen a steady increase in

New Medics

In 2014, we hired new Fire Fighter/Paramedics (FFPM) to the District. In September, we hired Chris Edwards. In December, we added Chris Gerlich. The hiring of new FFPM's takes a commitment from all members to ensure the high standards we set for all of our medics will continue. We wish them a long and safe career.

EMS Training

The continuing of our education as paramedics is a must. All paramedics receive continuing education (CE) through our EMS system, Good Samaritan Hospital. Currently, we receive this training from Jill Pateros, a nurse from Glen Oaks. In the past year, we completed a refresher in ACLS and taught our paramedics (PEARS), Pediatric Emergency Assessment, Recognition, and Stabilization. Also, we renewed all members in CPR. Lt. Robert Shea schedules all of our paramedic continuing education (CE) classes, any refresher trainings, and other EMS trainings. Additionally, he tracks all of the hours for recertification for each one of the paramedics.

EMS Supplies and Maintenance

In 2014, semi-annual maintenance on our stretchers was conducted on all of the ambulances. We did have one hydraulic leak that was fixed. 2 Zoll monitor carrying cases were replaced due to normal wear and tear. 2 Airway bags were replaced that were worn. 4 cordless stretcher batteries were replaced and 6 Zoll monitor batteries were replaced. We replaced a broken vacuum split from Medic 73 and Glen Oaks replaced a lost vacuum splint from Medic 73. Gun cases were purchased to comply with the new conceal carry law. A suction unit was replaced from Quint 71. We submitted a grant for King video laryngoscopes. We received the grant and look to put these units in service in 2015. Also, Zoll monitor maintenance was completed. Good Samaritan replaced the glucometers we purchased for the ALS vehicles. Lastly, the ALS vehicles passed all of the state and EMS system inspections. Thanks to Lt. Mike Polizzi and FFPM Mike Crivellone for their efforts to maintain our EMS equipment.

EMS Reporting/Image Trend CQI

To ensure a continued high quality level of emergency medical care the Addison Fire District has assigned each shift an EMS coordinator. Lt. Mike Polizzi (gold), Lt. Greg Hamm (red) and Lt. Jeff Pottle (black) have a daily responsibility to review the Image Trend reports. The reports are monitored for completeness, SOP compliance, spelling and grammar, times, etc. By doing the daily CQI we believe it will improve patient care and reduce potential litigation.

District EMS News

In 2014, we began to use Bluetooth technology to send our 12 lead EKG's to the hospitals. This system replaced the Rosetta. By far, this upgraded our abilities and improved our communications with the hospital. I am confident that this improved patient outcomes.


Burn Camp 2014



A place where the kids can gather to heal together, laugh together, explore, and challenge themselves. Bringing in campers, ages 8–16, from all across the state of Illinois, we meet together at the YMCA camp up by Fox Lake called Camp Duncan. Every year we get 65-85 campers to attend the week-long camp. The cost to the campers is completely free due to generous donations and fund raisers from an assortment of groups and fire departments. Besides the camp staff on hand, there are an additional 65 volunteers who spend their week with the kids as counselors, medical staff, quartermasters, and administration.











MUTUAL AID INCIDENTS BY TOWN






CALLS BY TYPE




